Community Chest Empowers Local Communities to Fight Youth Unemployment

## Teen job-seekers get help through Comstock Youth Works

Over 100 teen job seekers dodged the unemployment bullet this summer when they earned entrance to Community Chest's innovative job skills and summer employment program, Comstock Youth Works. The work was especially welcome since U.S. youths had less than a 30 percent chance of finding work this summer due to the recession.

Each youth applicant went through a program application process followed by several weeks of job skills classes on proper attire, punctuality, teamwork, resumé writing and interview tips before going on to interviews with local businesses. Wendy Madson of Community Roots, one of the business owners who employed teens from the program, explained that, "The hard part about being young is that few want to hire you when you have no experience. This program breaks that cycle."

The stimulus funds became available in the spring of 2009 through NevadaWorks, but the catch was that it needed to be implemented immediately and with great efficiency and quality. CCI put their experience to work and called upon their community partners to help and was awarded the grant. Community Chest's Erik Schoen oversaw programs from Yerington to Silver City that not only trained and employed 100 youth in area businesses, but also guided them on community improvement projects such as creating and maintaining community gardens in VC, Silver Springs, Yerington and Dayton, and the hard but rewarding physical labor of clearing dozens of senior yards, public parks, and nonprofits of weeds and other fire hazards.

Community Chest and their partners joined with area business owners who took a chance on not only hiring youths, but on actively training them and involving them in their businesses this summer. In return, the program paid the youth wages and continued to train the young people with classes such as conflict resolution, money management, and business etiquette. The Dayton Chevron owner said, "We had an opportunity handed to us, although we were reluctant at first because we didn't know anything about the program. I'd like to tell business owners that this is a great program and a great way to reach out to youth in our community. We are proud of the work Elica did. She did everything we asked of her and more, and we've offered her a position at Chevron."

Stories like these illustrate the success of empowering local people to meet community adversity head on to make a difference in people's lives.
